The Damen ASD 2810 tugs Smit Seine and Smit Ebro and the Damen ASD 3213 Smit Cheetah. Sponsor ladies are employee's of Smit. The Smit Seine was christened by Brigitte van Breugel, General Manager Fiscal Affairs.
